Several years ago the Coffee County Fair Board requested support from the Tennessee Valley Woodworkers Club to bolster their craft demonstration area in the Morton Children's Village area of the fair. Since then, the club presence at the fair and the cooperation between the Fair Board and the Club has grown.

Earlier this year the Board invited the Club to construct a building, for the club's demonstrations, in the Morton Village. The Fair Board provided the materials, and the club designed and built the 16 by 20 foot building to fit into the basic architecture of the village and to provide shelter for the club members and their projects as well as for visiting fair guests. As Saturday evening grew on and the mule races started, the tired club members started cleaning up and talking about next year at the fair. The major topic of discussion was: "How do we top this?"
